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#### POSTOPERATIVE INSTRUCTIONS

### **Grommet insertion**

No need to keep the ears dry Use drops as prescribed Occasional blood-stained discharge Back to nursery/school next day Calpol/Nurofen as required

# Adenoidectomy

Temperature and blocked nose common Occasional smell if adenoids large School - Friday (Day 2) if well Calpol/Nurofen as required

### **Tonsillectomy**

Encourage eating (any food)
Encourage drinking
Take antibiotics as prescribed
Take pain killers as prescribed

## **Full Tonsillectomy**

Pain worse days 4-10; School on Monday (Day 10)
Shave Tonsillectomy
School on following Monday/Tuesday
You can't fly for 10-14 days post op

?diarrhoea, constipation, nausea and vomiting
Occasional bleeding at one week to ten days
Call duty sister for any post-tonsillectomy bleeding
(0207 580 4400) They will call me to discuss
Brisk bleeding – go straight to Casualty

#### POSTOPERATIVE MEDICATIONS

## **Grommet insertion**

Ciloxan EYE drops to be used in the EARS, 2 drops 2 - 3 times a day for usually one week. These drops help to prevent infection and to prevent the grommets becoming blocked.

## Adenoidectomy

Antibiotics are given to prevent infection of the adenoid bed which produces a foul smell and a very blocked nose, with a high temperature. Usually, Augmentin is given in appropriate doses 3 times per day for a week, though other antibiotics may be used if the patient is allergic to Penicillin.

## **Tonsillectomy**

Dr. Lloyd-Thomas writes up a complicated but important regime of pain relief. Usually, this consists of:

#### 1. Paracetamol

# 2.Either

# Voltarol (Diclofenac) suppositories OR... Nurofen orally

Nurofen is given orally instead of the Voltarol suppositories and should <u>not</u> be given at the same time.

The Nurofen and Paracetamol work differently and <u>can</u> be given at the same time though ideally the smoothest pain relief is usually attained if the doses are interdigitated, e.g. Paracetamol at time 0, Nurofen + 4 hours, Paracetamol + 8hours, Nurofen + 12 hours, etc.

3. Tramadol / Dihydrocodeine may be prescribed in addition

Postoperative appointment is on your postoperative report
